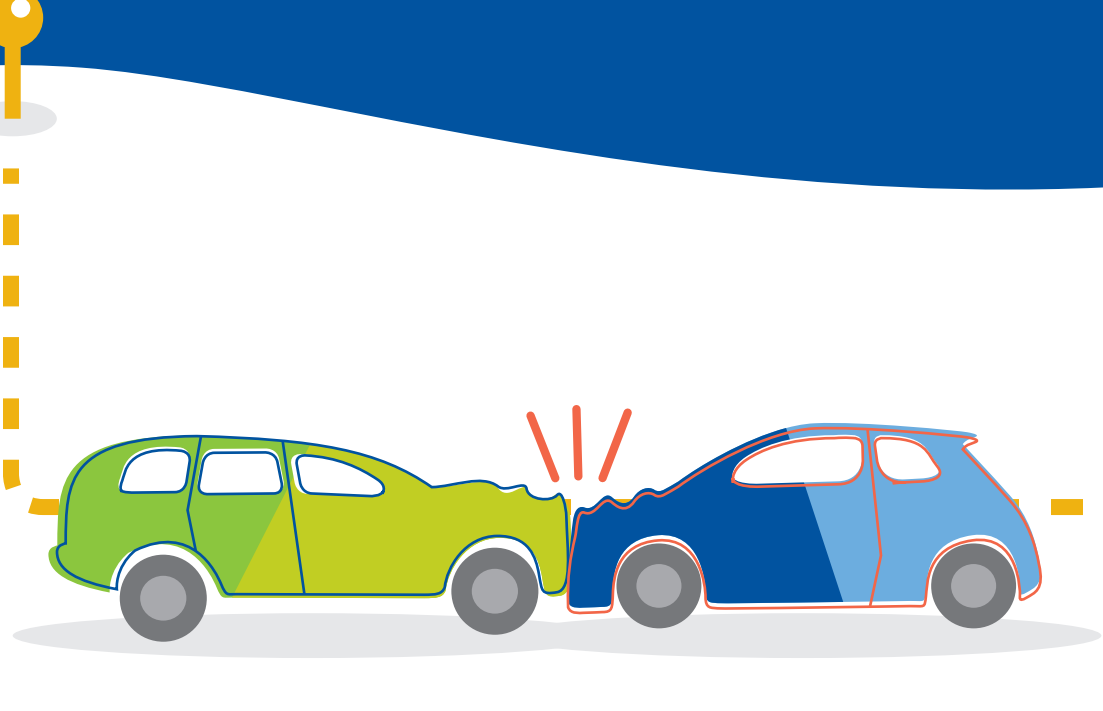


TEENAGE DRIVERS: KNOW YOUR CHILD'S RISKS

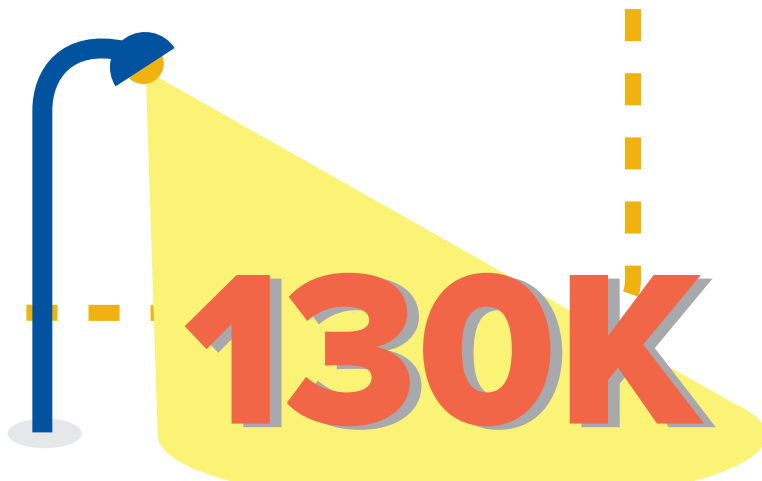

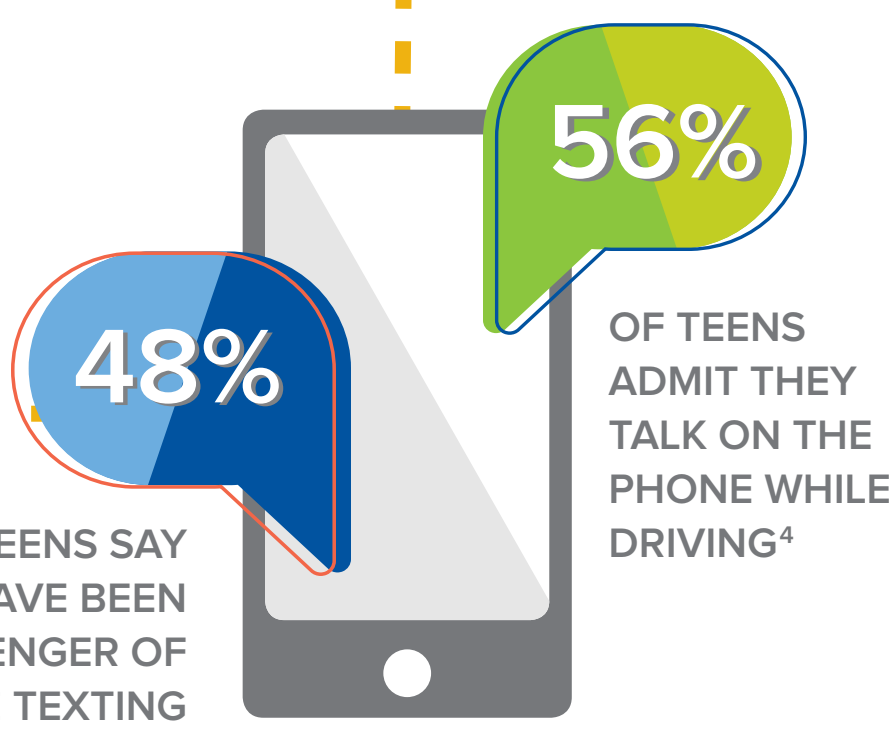
16-YEAR-OLDS HAVE THE HIGHEST CRASH RATE OF ANY DRIVERS¹



CAR CRASHES ARE THE LEADING CAUSE OF TEEN DEATH³

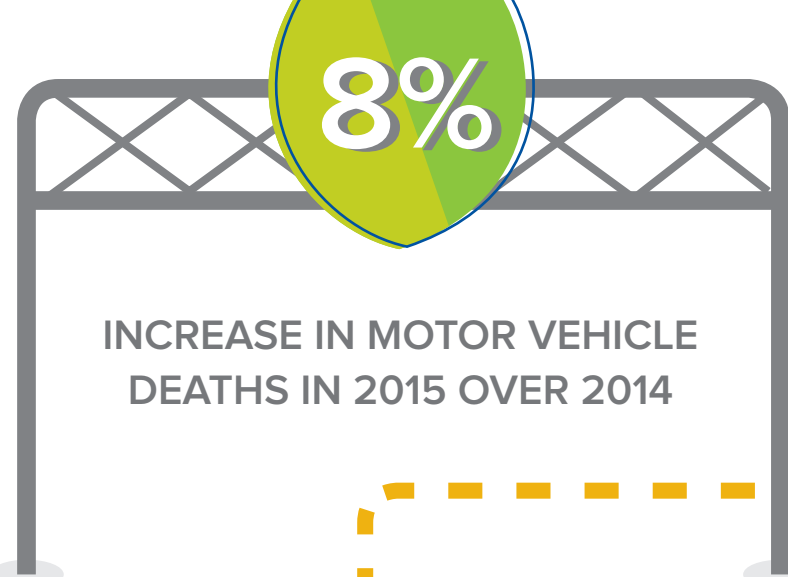
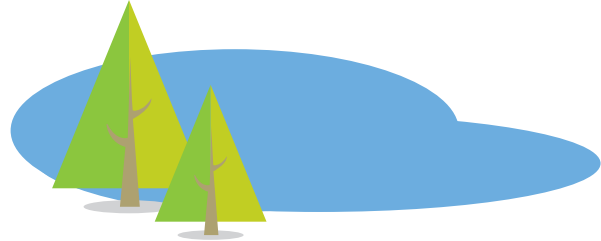


TEENS INJURED IN ACCIDENTS IN 2013 ALONE²

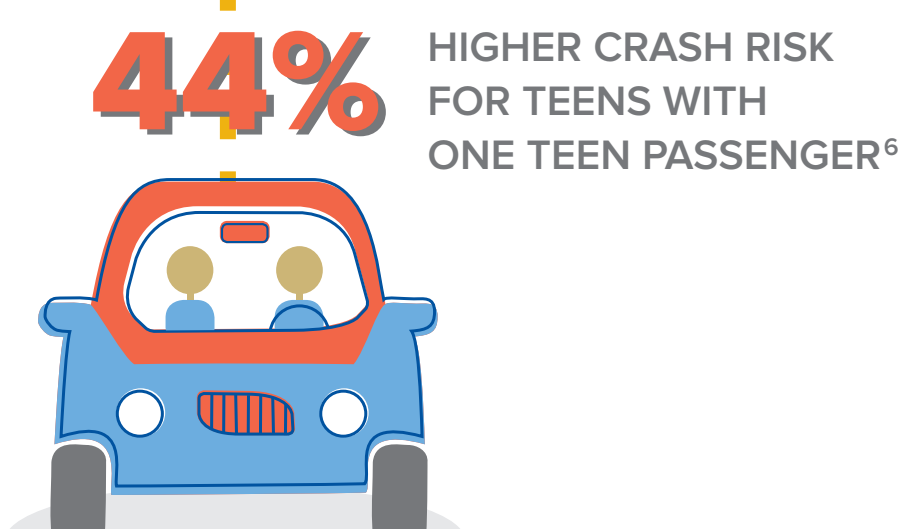


48% OF TEENS SAY THEY HAVE BEEN A PASSENGER OF SOMEONE TEXTING WHILE DRIVING⁴

2 MILLION TEENS WILL BE FIRST-YEAR DRIVERS THIS YEAR⁸

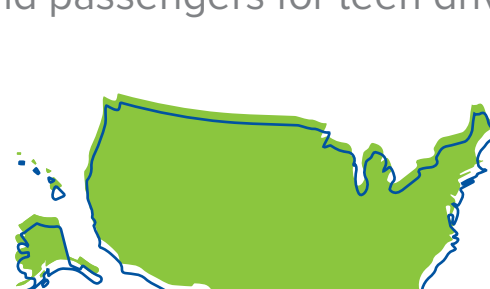
"5 TO DRIVE"

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's "5 to Drive" list is a convenient reminder for parents to make sure their teens follow these five rules before driving:

- 1 NO CELL PHONES
- 2 NO EXTRA PASSENGERS
- 3 NO SPEEDING
- 4 NO ALCOHOL
- 5 NO DRIVING OR RIDING WITHOUT A SEATBELT

TEENAGE DRIVING LAWS

Many states, including Michigan, Wisconsin and Illinois, have adopted Graduated Driver Licensing Laws, or GDL, to allow teen drivers to work up to full driving privileges over a series of stages. These states also have laws that place restrictions on phone use, nighttime driving and passengers for teen drivers.
